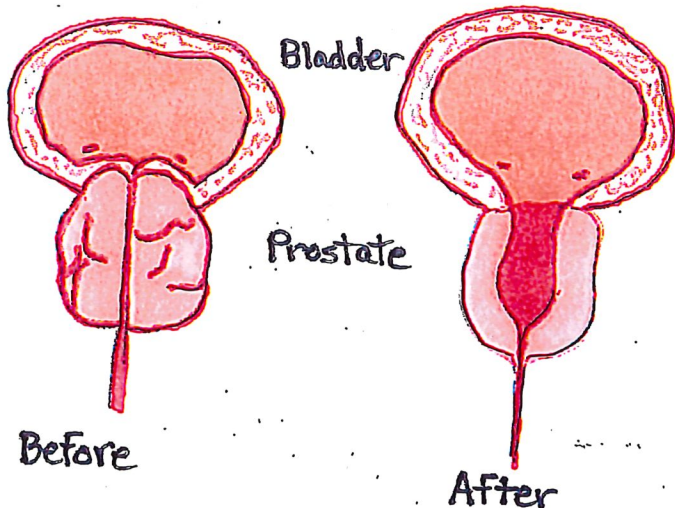
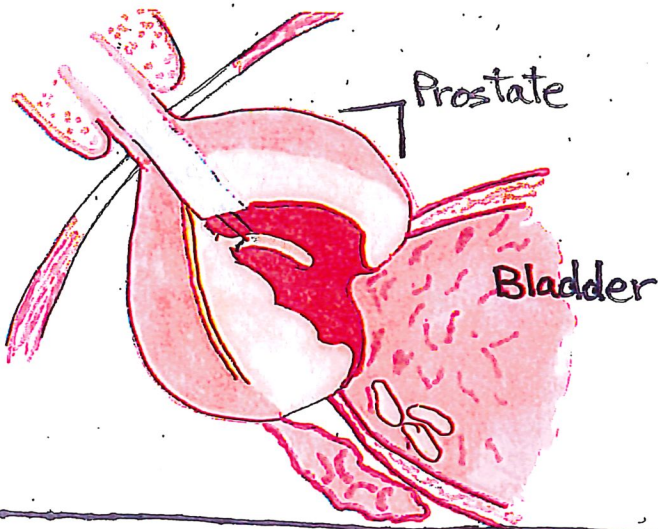
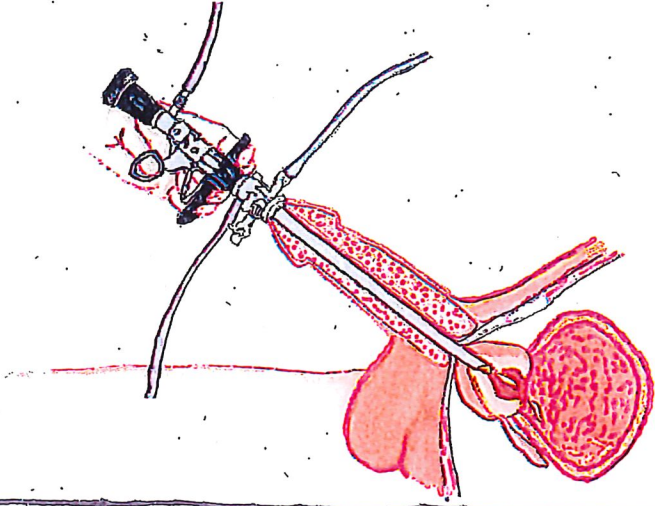


TURP INFORMATION

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- The inside of the prostate is removed in surgery using a resectoscope. This is commonly known as a "Roto-Rooter".
- Usually the patient stays over night in the hospital but this may be longer if necessary.
- Catheter stays in for 2 to 4 days and is removed in the office.
- The patient should try to avoid tension on the catheter as this can cause bladder spasms.
- After the procedure, drink plenty of fluid and avoid constipation.
